<u>Award Centre</u>	Award Unit	All organisations and schools will now be referred to as Award Centres.	Please update your school or organisation's website and materials to reflect these changes.
<u>National Award Operator (NAO)</u>	National Award Authority (NAA)	Refers to the national organisation and head office in Australia	
<u>Gold Residential Project</u>	Residential project	Better reflects that the Gold Residential Project is only for Gold Participants	
<u>Skills</u>	Skill	Better reflects the ethos of the Section	
<u>Voluntary Service</u>	Service	Better reflects the ethos of the Section	
<u>Award Holder</u>	Awardee	The title of anyone who completes the Award	

Did You Know?

Award Leader	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> The Award Leader is an adult appointed by an Award Centre to be the contact and mentor for a group of Award Participants. The Award Leader is responsible for engaging young people in the program, inspiring, guiding and assisting them from start through to completion.
Award Coordinator	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> The Award Coordinator is the senior Award Leader at Award Centres where there is more than one Award Leader. They are responsible for setting up and running the Award within the Centre, supporting Award Leaders, overseeing Award Groups and processing the authorisation of Awards.
Lead Coordinator (ORB Only)	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> Lead Coordinator is used in the Online Record Book. It refers to the primary contact for invoicing purposes not the Award Coordinator.
Authorising Contact (ORB Only)	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> Authorising Contact is used in the Online Record Book. It refers to the decision-maker who has signed the Award Centre licence, and has the authority to enter into agreements on behalf of the Award Centre.
